We Pray For

Prayer for Discernment and Election of Next Presiding Bishop

Almighty God, source of all wisdom and understanding: Look graciously on your church, and so guide the hearts and minds of those who will choose our next presiding bishop, that we may receive a faithful pastor who will care for all of your people, equip us for our ministries, and proclaim your word to us and to the world, through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: The Nippon Sei Ko Kai (The Anglican Communion in Japan)

Jesuits and Franciscans brought Christianity to Japan in the mid-16th century, but Christianity was outlawed in 1587, and persecution led to "The Martyrs of Japan" (remembered on our Church calendar on February 6th). In 1640 all foreigners were expelled, and Japanese isolation continued for two centuries. In 1859 our Episcopal Church sent missionaries, and they were followed by those from England's Church Missionary Society and Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and from the Anglican Church of Canada. With greater freedom of religion, by 1906 there were 42 Japanese priests. Not surprisingly, World War II was a difficult time for the Nippon Sei Ko Kai. After the war, it worked to rebuild, and it became a self-supporting province of the Anglican Communion in 1972. As a trivia aside, Japan's presiding bishop gave the Archbishop of Canterbury a silk cope and mitre in 1948, in thanksgiving for continuing in Anglican fellowship, and the Archbishop wore it at the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II.
