



We Pray For

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: The Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia *This province principally includes New Zealand (Aotearoa is the Māori name for New Zealand) along with Fiji, Tonga, and Samoa. Church Missionary Society work among the Māori in New Zealand early in the 19th century was followed by church development among Anglican settlers arriving in mid-century, which quickly led to Anglicanism becoming the largest religious denomination in the country. New Zealand Anglicans have been especially sensitive to cultural diversity, asserting that it is "the right of every person to choose any particular cultural expression of the faith." Its prayer book (A New Zealand Prayer Book, 1989) is considered by many to be the finest example of Anglican liturgy emerging from the liturgical renewal movement late in the last century.*

HUGS is about acknowledging the good creation in each of us and more fully knowing and loving our God through it. The great differences among campers and staff help all of us learn to appreciate and celebrate our diversity as we recognize our common ground.

• **Buddy campers** are rising 9th-12th graders who help campers with special needs enjoy all aspects of a typical summer camp experience. Buddy campers arrive on Saturday, July 6, to be trained to work with campers with special needs, who arrive on Monday, July 8.

• **Staff** must have completed their first year of college and are expected to stay in cabins with campers, as well as serve on one of the following teams: camp life, worship, activities or program. Before camp, there is a mandatory Zoom meeting with the entire staff, as well as individual meetings with the team you have been assigned. Staff earn a stipend for their work.
