

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: The Anglican Church of Australia

In 1788 the "First Fleet" brought convicts, the military, officials, and a Church of England chaplain to New South Wales in Australia, marking both the beginning of the British colony and the beginning of Australian Anglicanism. Throughout colonial history Christians were mainly divided between Anglicans and Roman Catholics (many of the convicts were Irish), and today they remain the two largest churches in Australia. Anglicans began mission work among the aborigines in the 19th century. The Church became its own separate province in 1962. In 2022 conservative Anglicans in Sydney broke away from the Anglican Church of Australia, calling themselves the Diocese of the Southern Cross.

For a time I rest in the grace of the world, and am free.
