We Pray For

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: The Church of the Province of Myanmar (Burma)

Anglican chaplains accompanied the British Army in Burma in 1824, but mission work itself only began with the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in the mid-1850s. The Mission to Seamen established themselves in 1907, and the Bible Churchmen's Missionary Society in the 1920s. Many Anglicans were Anglo-Burmese or Anglo-Indian (persons of either British and Burmese or British and Indian descent). Many left at independence in 1948, leading to a sharp decline in the number of Anglicans in this overwhelmingly Buddhist nation. In 1961 Buddhism was declared the state religion, and five years later all foreign missionaries were expelled. From its early years Anglicans in Burma had been part of the Church of England in India; in 1930 they became part of a province named the Church of India, Burma, and Ceylon. The Burmese church became its own province in 1970, renamed the Church of the Province of Myanmar when the country changed its name in 1989.

Adult Formation Begins Next Sunday with a Book Study on A Voice in the Wilderness

In 2022, The Next Big Idea Club listed *A Voice in the Wilderness: A Pioneering Biologist Explains How Evolution Can Help Us Solve Our Biggest Problems* (Basic Books) by Joseph L. Graves, Jr., as one of its 26 best science books of the year (https://bit.ly/Top26ScienceBooks2022). In May 2023, *Christianity Today* published a scathing review of the book written by the anti-science Discovery Institute. And a month later, the scholarly journal *Black Theology* hailed it for its "prophetic voice." *A Voice in the Wilderness* is an exploration of the scientific career of Dr. Joseph L. Graves, Jr., who is a St. Andrew's parishioner. This month, we will offer a three-week formation study to discuss the main themes of the book: racism within science and how Joe Graves became the first African American evolutionary biologist; how to have a productive dialog between faith and science; and what evolutionary science can tell us about how to solve some of our biggest social problems. We hope you will start reading now and join us *Sundays, September 15, 22, and 29, right after worship*. Our study will focus on Chapters 1, 9, 10, and 14. The book is available for order through local book sellers and online.

Living Compass Class for Parents (begins September 15, Library)

Grounded in Scripture, the tradition of the Church, and the sharing our own stories, this course is designed to support participants as they seek to live the abundant life God intends for them. We often say that you have to put on your own life vest before you can help another, but it is easy to lose sight of our own well-being when we are actively parenting. The Living Compass is a model that invites us to attend to our mind, heart, strength, and soul. In a small group setting, we'll create a space of rest, contemplation, deep conversation, and compassion, while learning to better care for ourselves as we care for our kids. The class runs concurrently with our *Confirmation for Youth* course, and childcare will be available. We will also be using this Living Compass model for our senior high EYC in the spring. Confirmation is the sacramental rite through which persons **confirm** their baptismal vows and deepen their commitment to the Episcopal Church. Those wishing to join the Episcopal Church may do so through confirmation or, if confirmed already, through reception or a reaffirmation of their confirmation commitment. Persons already confirmed in other churches adhering to the apostolic succession (such as Roman Catholic and Lutheran) are not confirmed again but **received** into our communion. Help Welcome Our Afghan Allies

Since the U.S. withdrawal from Afghanistan in August 2021, more than 97,000 Afghans, including those who worked alongside U.S. military, diplomats, and aid workers in Afghanistan, have arrived in the U.S. seeking safety. Episcopal Migration Ministries and other agencies have worked to resettle those Afghans who were able to leave Afghanistan, many of whom face an uncertain future without legal permanent status. As Christians, we have the opportunity to help the vulnerable and extend welcome to those who seek refuge. We have a particular obligation to help those who worked alongside the U.S. government, as well as those most at risk when the Taliban returned to power. We are renewing our call for Congress to support passage of the "Afghan Adjustment Act" (S.Amdt.2682 to S.4638) as an amendment to the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2025 or as a standalone bill to create a dedicated path to permanent status for Afghans in the United States. *Please visit https://www.votervoice.net/EPISCOPAL/Campaigns/99981/Respond and write your letters today!*
