The Word of God

James 3:13-4:3, 7-8a

Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be

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boastful and false to the truth. Such wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, willing to yield, full of mercy and good fruits, without a trace of partiality or hypocrisy. And a harvest of righteousness is sown in peace for those who make peace.

Those conflicts and disputes among you, where do they come from? Do they not come from your cravings that are at war within you? You want something and do not have it; so you commit murder. Anglican Cycle of Prayer. The Church of North India (United)

In the early 19th century, many in Britain linked rule in India with the "Christianization" of India, and in fact, in 1813, Parliament required that the ruling East India Company not only open the subcontinent to Christian missions but endow an established Church in India. With this encouragement, the Church Missionary Society and the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel advanced their India work, but the "Indian Mutiny" of 1857 prompted India's rulers to introduce a policy of strict religious neutrality in a territory which, after all, was overwhelmingly Hindu and Muslim. Christian mission work did continue, however, and in the early 20th century talk of a United Church of South India became prominent in ecumenical circles. North India was secondary, but finally, in 1970, Anglicans, Methodists, Congregationalists, Presbyterians, the Brethren and Disciples, and Baptists came together in the United Church of North India. This Church is now in full communion with the Anglican Communion.

Our Book Study on A Voice in the Wilderness Continues-Right after Worship in the Cloister

In 2022, The Next Big Idea Club listed *A Voice in the Wilderness: A Pioneering Biologist Explains How Evolution Can Help Us Solve Our Biggest Problems* (Basic Books) by Joseph L. Graves, Jr., as one of its 26 best science books of the year (<u>https://bit.ly/Top26ScienceBooks2022</u>). In May 2023, *Christianity Today* published a scathing review of the book written by the anti-science Discovery Institute. And a month later, the scholarly journal *Black Theology* hailed it for its "prophetic voice." *A Voice in the Wilderness* is an exploration of the scientific career of Dr. Joseph L. Graves, Jr., who is a St. Andrew's parishioner. Join us after worship in the Cloister as we continue our three-week study on the book's main themes.

Living Compass Class for Parents Continues-Right after Worship in the Library

Grounded in Scripture, the tradition of the Church, and the sharing our own stories, this course is designed to support participants as they seek to live the abundant life God intends for them. We often say that you have to put on your own life vest before you can help another, but it is easy to lose sight of our own well-being when we are actively parenting. The Living Compass is a model that invites us to attend to our mind, heart, strength, and soul. In a small group setting, we'll create a space of rest, contemplation, deep conversation, and compassion, while learning to better care for ourselves as we care for our kids. The class runs through October 27, concurrently with our *Confirmation for Youth* course, and childcare will be available. Facilitated by Anna Taylor and Rev. Ginny Inman.
