The Word of God

The First Reading Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? 

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: The Church of Bangladesh

Christianity came to Bengal, in what was then India, during the colonial period. The region became the eastern part of Pakistan with the partition of the subcontinent into India and Pakistan in 1947. Following a war of liberation in 1971, East Pakistan separated from West Pakistan and became an independent Bangladesh. The Church of Bangladesh follows the pattern of Pakistan and India, with the creation of united churches. In Bangladesh, the united Church consists mainly of those from Anglican and Presbyterian traditions. They make up only 0.3% of the population of the country.

In this book, McGhee embarks on a deeply personal journey across the country from Mississippi to California to Maine, tallying what we lose when we buy into the zero-sum paradigm—the idea that progress for some of us must come at the expense of others. But in unlikely places of worship and work, McGhee finds proof of what she calls the "Solidarity Dividend," gains that come when people come together across race to accomplish what we simply can't do on our own.
