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We Pray For

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: The Church of Pakistan (United)

Tradition has it that the Apostle Thomas introduced Christianity to the Indian sub-continent, which consisted of what is now (since partition in 1947) both India and Pakistan. Evangelization among Muslims – the dominant population of Pakistan – has never been very successful globally, and most Christians in Pakistan came not from among Muslims but from the Dalit (the historic lower caste among Hindus) in the Punjab region. Today Christians are just a tiny percentage of the population. A united church, instead of multiple denominations, made good sense under the circumstances, and in 1970 the Church of Pakistan (including Anglicans) became the fourth of the united churches in full communion with the Anglican Communion (the others being South India, North India, and Bangladesh). Pakistan, which became an Islamic Republic in 1956, nationalized most Christian schools in 1972. In recent years, however, some have been returned to the church, and there is hope that others will follow. Prominent institutions include Edwardes College Peshawar, with which the Episcopal Church has had significant ties.

St. Andrew's Summer of Sabbath and Solidarity

This summer, you are invited to prioritize the rhythm of loving God and neighbor that sustains us. Keeping the sabbath is part of the fabric of creation and one of God's Ten Commandments. Sabbath provides us intentional time and space to breathe deeply, to return to God, and to be renewed.
