We Pray For

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: The Church in the Province of the West Indies

Anglicanism in the West Indies dates to the 17th century, when clergy came to serve wealthy British planters and merchants. Mission initiatives among the indigenous populations expanded the Church in Barbados, Belize, Guyana, Jamaica, the Bahamas, Aruba, Trinidad and Tobago, and the Windward Islands. Although the province only officially came into being in 1883, the dioceses of Jamaica and of Barbados were already celebrating their 200th anniversary in 2024. Codrington College in Barbados (shown in our eNews), is one of the oldest theological colleges in the Western hemisphere. Founded in 1745 with profits from the sugar cane estates bequeathed to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts (SPG) by Christopher Codrington, the school benefitted for some years from slavery.

The Corner Farmers Market Responds to SNAP Shortfall—Spread the Word & Give if You Can While SNAP benefits are in limbo, food insecurity persists. The Corner Farmers Market, which already encourages use of SNAP benefits to shop weekly for fresh local food, is redoubling its efforts, and last Saturday began offering \$75 in Market Tokens to SNAP cardholders. There was a record high in SNAP sales that day, and use of the benefit is expected to rise. Corner Market shoppers and vendors alike rely on weekly sales to feed their families, and the Market has pledged to continue to offer Market Tokens until SNAP benefits are released or the Market's Green for Greens fund is exhausted. Meanwhile they are working to bolster that fund. St. Andrew's is actively engaged and is offering a \$3,000 matching grant for an upcoming Saturday. You can help too!
