Welcome to this Morning's Lessons & Carols Service!

Advent is a season of spiritual preparation that holds together quiet reflection and joyful expectation. Today's Lessons and Carols Service consists of scripture readings interspersed with choral presentations and hymns, all of which recall our human longing for liberation from sin and death as well as our hope and expectation for the coming of Christ the Lord. The liturgy of this service embodies the sense of Advent movement—through the choir's processions and in the increasingly powerful prophecies and promises of Holy Scripture. May these words and this music draw you toward the true joy of Christmas.

History of the Lessons & Carols Service: In the Anglican tradition, the Lessons & Carols service began in 1878 and was formalized as a Christmas service in 1880 by the Bishop of Truro, later Archbishop of Canterbury, Edward Benson. An Advent version of the service developed slightly later at King's College in England and is now celebrated around the world.

Lesson VI Mark 1:1–15 Craig Taylor

Jesus is baptized by John and proclaims the coming of the Kingdom of God

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'"

John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. We Pray For

Anglican Cycle of Prayer: Igreja Episcopal Anglicana do Brasil

In the last half-century or so, the liturgical renewal movement transformed worship throughout the world. The movement actually had its beginnings in the 19th century when French Benedictines, at the abbey at Solesmes, initiated liturgical scholarship. They drew upon new discoveries of ancient manuscripts, and when Pope Pius X called a conference in Belgium in 1909 to examine liturgy in light of these developments, some say the liturgical movement "officially" began. As the 20th century progressed, the movement became more ecumenical, and as colonialism ended, people sought liturgy that was more in harmony with their culture and tradition. All of this gave rise to the array of prayer books that emerged in the Anglican Communion. No longer did Anglicans worship only in accord with the Church of England's 1662 Book of Common Prayer. Our Book of Common Prayer in 1979 is testimony to that.

From time to time this church year we will share prayers and collects from Anglican prayer books around the world. We begin today with an Advent collect from the Anglican Church of Southern Africa's 1989 An Anglican Prayer Book. (It is also in use in our companion Diocese of Botswana.)

Almighty and eternal God, purify our hearts and minds, that when your Son Jesus Christ comes again in glory, he may find in us a home prepared for himself; who is alive and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and for ever. *Amen*.


