Welcome to today's worship.

Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen Indeed! Alleluia! Today is the Feast of feasts—Easter, when Christians around the world celebrate Jesus's glorious resurrection from the dead. The resurrection of Christ has been a focal point of Christian confession since the early church; Christians have understood the resurrection to be the central witness of God's radical action in human history. Today the joy of an empty tomb erupts from us in praise of Jesus, the one who sits at the right hand of God in whom we too are raised as a new creation. As a sign of this joy, you are invited to ring a bell every time we say or sing Alleluia in today's service.

If you are new to our service, please take a moment to fill out our welcome card so we can get to know you. Please use this bulletin, the red Book of Common Prayer (BCP), and the blue Hymnal to follow along in worship. Nursery care is available down the stairs at the back of the church for children 5 and under. Children in kindergarten and up will stay in church for this special day of worship. We have special Easter bags to keep little hearts and hands engaged, with butterflies to color and bells to ring at each "Alleluia."

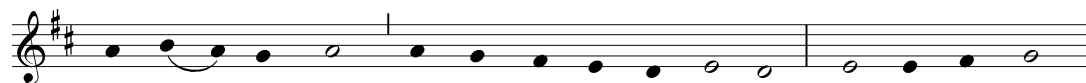

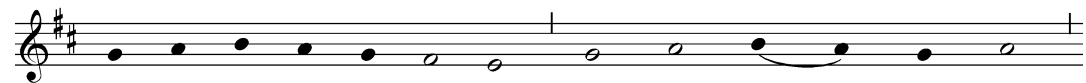

Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, “They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.” Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went toward the tomb. The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus’ head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the head and the other at the feet. They said to her, “Woman, why are you weeping?” She said to them, “They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him.” When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, “Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?” Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, “Sir, if you have

carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "Rabbouni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet ascended to the Father. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her.

May all who have died be received at your heavenly banquet and may we be one in faith with all of them, for our life is hid with Christ in God; for Christ is risen: ***Lord, hear our prayer.***

A Peals for Peace: Community Call to Prayer and Peace through the Ringing of Bells—April 6, 6:00–6:30 p.m.

On Easter Monday at 6 p.m., you’re invited to join St. Andrew’s and faith communities across the state in a simple yet powerful act: ringing bells and offering prayers for peace. For centuries, bells have called communities to prayer, marked moments of sorrow and celebration, and reminded people of God’s presence. In a time of uncertainty and division, the sound of bells ringing together across our communities serves as a gentle, powerful reminder that faith still calls us toward peace. Inspired by the quiet and humble witness of the Buddhist Monks’ Walk for Peace, this moment invites all faith traditions into a shared expression of hope, unity, and compassion. Places of worship with bells are invited to ring bells beginning at 6:00 p.m. for thirty minutes. All others are invited to step outside, ring any bell you have, pray, or simply pause and listen. Your participation—large or small—creates a shared, ecumenical witness for peace across our state.

The program rests on the foundation that all baptized Christians are called to be ministers and provides the tools necessary to nurture that call to Christian service in the places where they live, work, and play. By participating, seekers become more theologically informed, reflective, and prepared to respond to the call of a Christian life.
